Goods & Services

Introduction

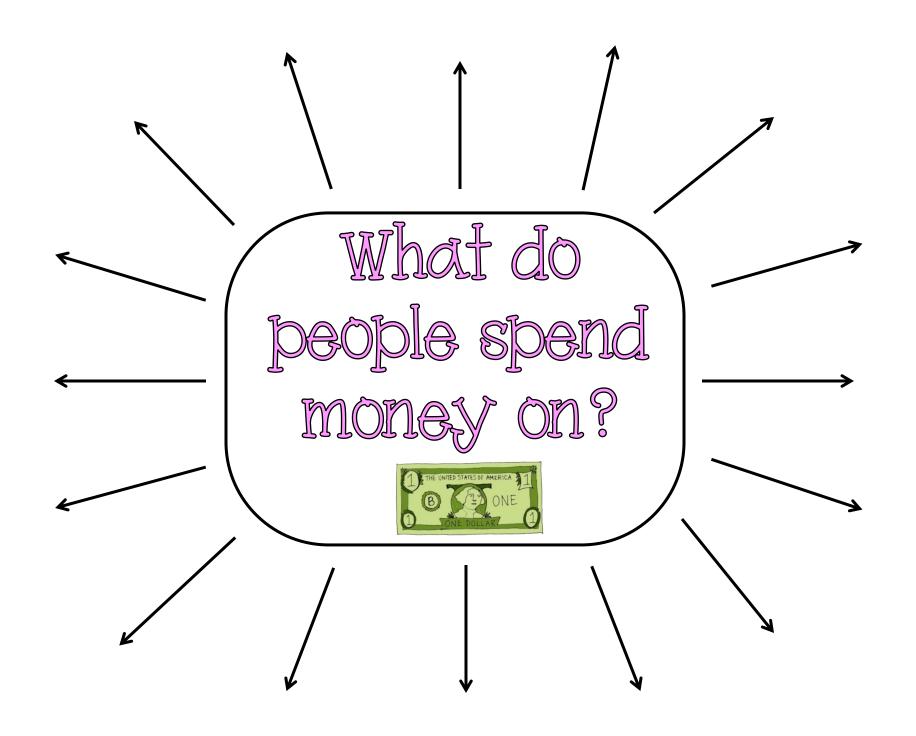
As an introduction activity we chart as a class "What people spend money on." Students do a great job coming up with things like toys, electronics, food, going to the movies, bills, etc. After they have finished sharing ideas I introduce the vocabulary words "goods & services" and we categorize the web into these two categories.

Goods & Services Sort

Pefore beginning the sort, place several items that represent goods or services in a bag. Pull out the items one at a time and allow students to guess and explain why each item is either a good or service. After this activity, allow students to work with a partner or independently and sort the pictures into the different categories on the I-chart. As an extension you could have students choose 5 pictures and write a sentence to explain why each is good or service.

Producers & Consumers

Producers & Consumers Match

A producer is someone who makes or provides goods and services. A consumer is someone who uses or buys goods and services. After teaching students this concept, use the "producers & consumers match" activity. For this activity cut apart the cards and mix them up. Students then match the producer picture to the correct consumer picture.

I Am a Producer & Consumer

To help students better understand the roles of producers and consumers, I have them think about how they are both produces and consumers. They sometimes get stuck on how only adults are producers. We the book "Arthur's Pet Business," and we talk about how even though Arthur is a kid, he is still a producer. We then brainstorm ways in which they are both producers and consumers. (Producers- when they do their classroom jobs, earn an allowance around the house by doing chores, having a lemonade stand, etc.) (Consumers- eat snacks, buy things at the store, go to a movie, eat at a restaurant, get a haircut, etc.) They then complete the "I am producer and consumer" sheet and share.

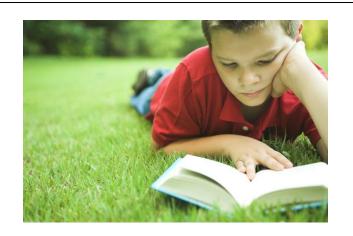

Henry Ford's Assembly Line

Henry Ford was an extremely important part of our country's economic growth. I use him as a model to teach many of the Key economic concepts throughout the unit. The Kids find him fascinating! Henry Ford was the first to use assembly lines to create vehicles that were affordable to the everyday family. On You Tube there are many videos that show what an assembly line looked like in Ford's factory. I use this one because it is VERY clear http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=S4KrIMZpuCY. After watching this video, we watch videos on modern assembly lines. I like to use the "How It's Made" videos. They have videos on the Crunch Bar, Runts, and cars. We then complete the Venn Diagram comparing and contrasting Ford's assembly line to Modern Day assembly lines.

Student Assembly Line

After learning about how assembly lines work and why they are so important, students have the opportunity to work in groups and produce their own product using an assembly line.

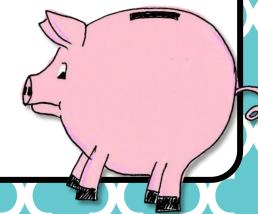

Students work together & plan their role using the planning sheet. The end product is an edible car.

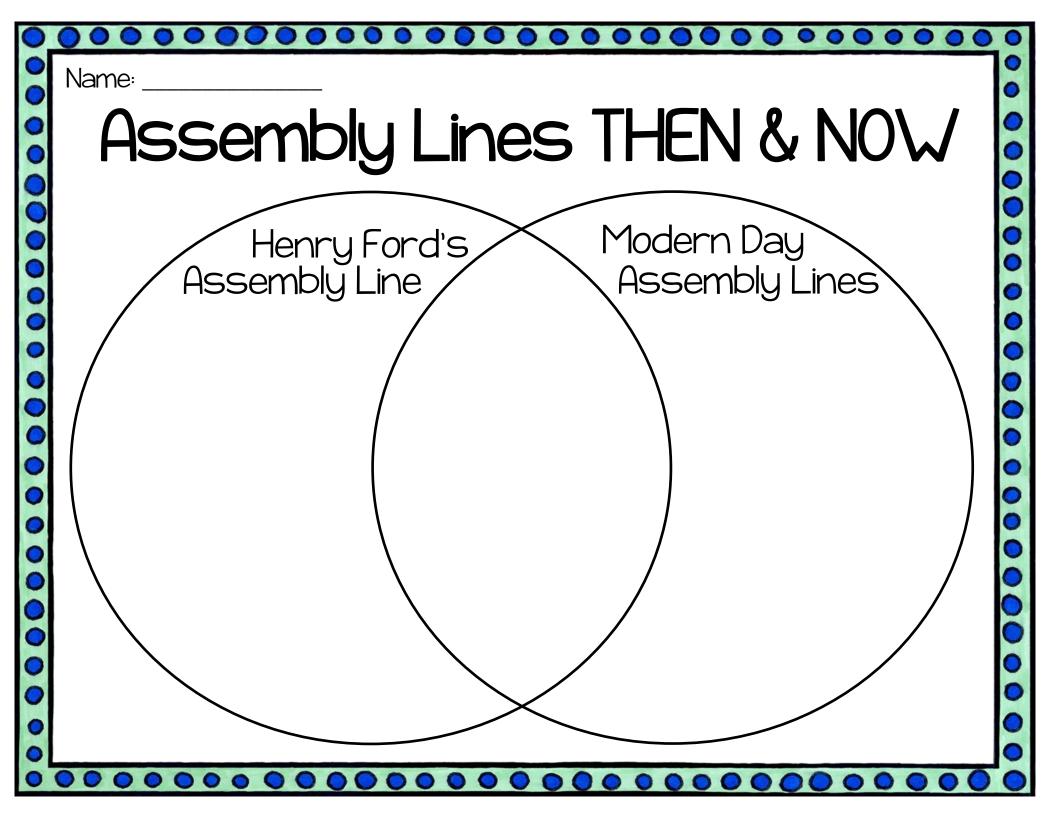

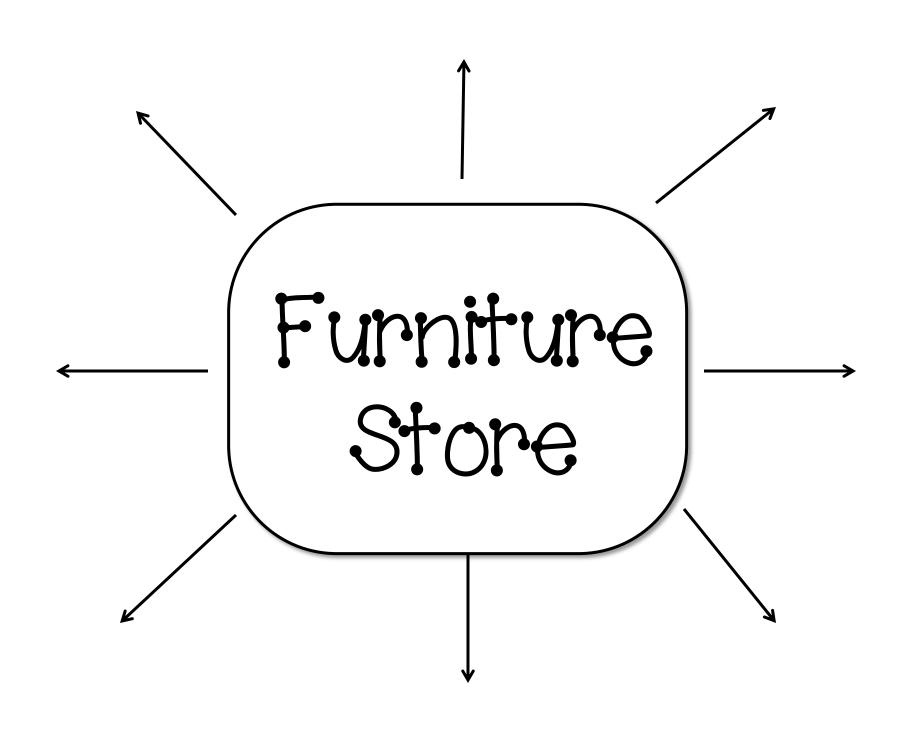
Business Brainstorm

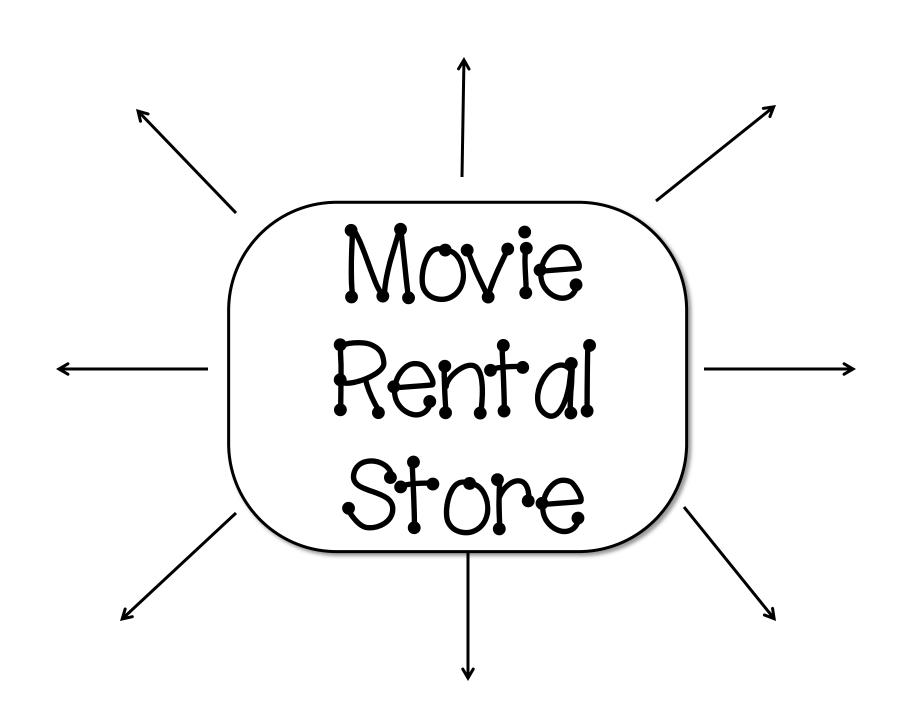
After discussing with students what a business is, I place them into pairs/small groups and have them work together. I give each pair/small group a different business and have them brainstorm all the different things they think they would need to run that business. We then share as a class.

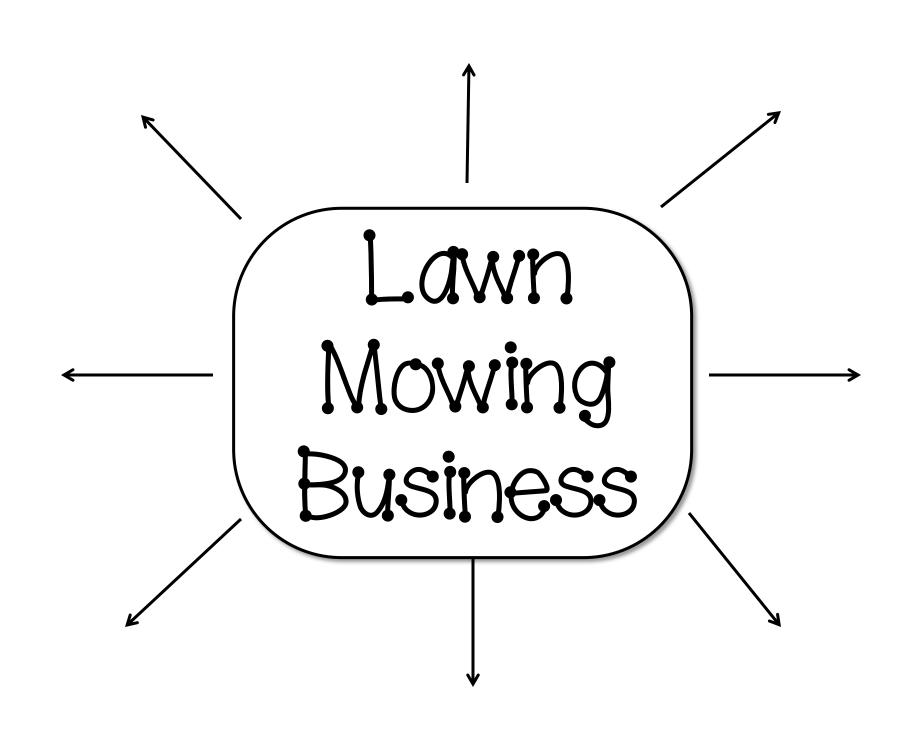
"What's the cost of my Business?"

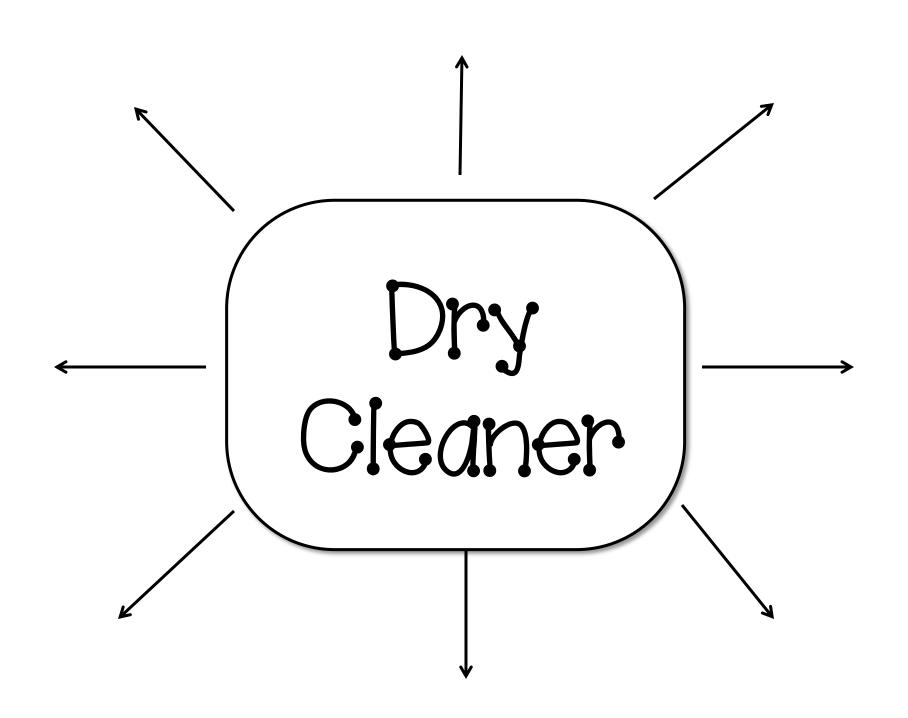
After talking about overhead and the cost of running a business, I have my students complete this activity. I laminate and place the different information sheets around the classroom. I place students into small groups and have them rotate through the different stations. At each station they read the business description aloud and then come up with the different things that would be included in the overhead. I allow students to use dry erase markers to underline the different things included in the overhead since they are laminated. They record their findings on the recording sheet. I use the cupcake one as an example for the whole group and this helps them really understand the activity.

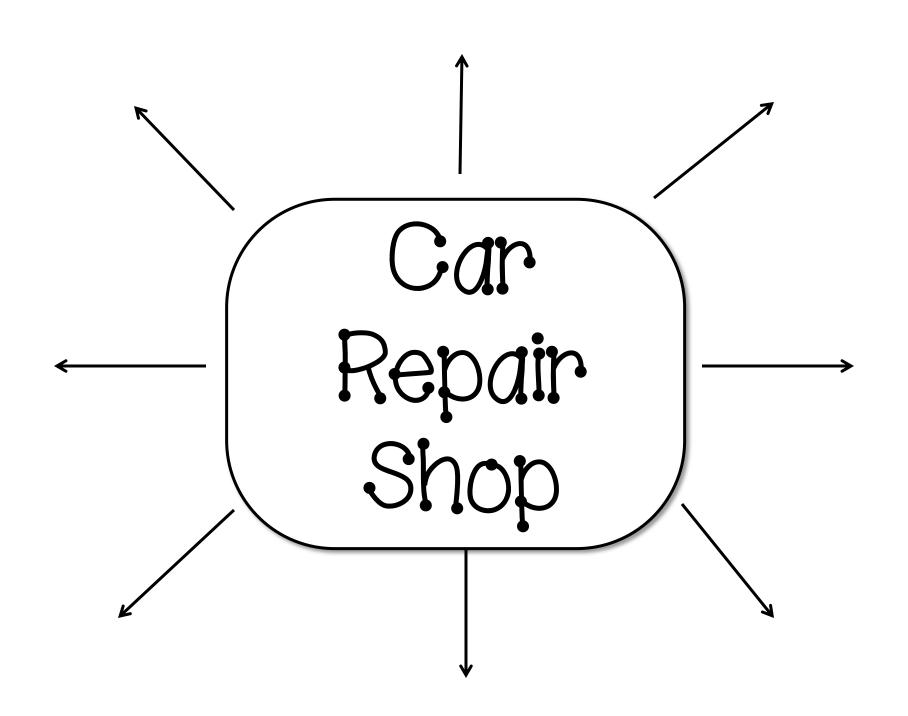


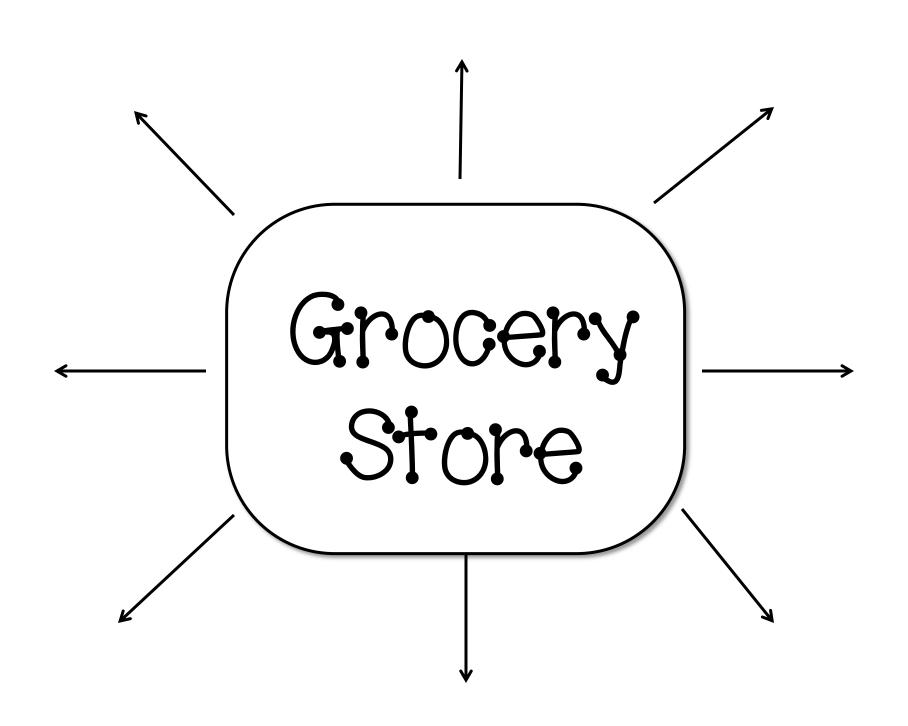


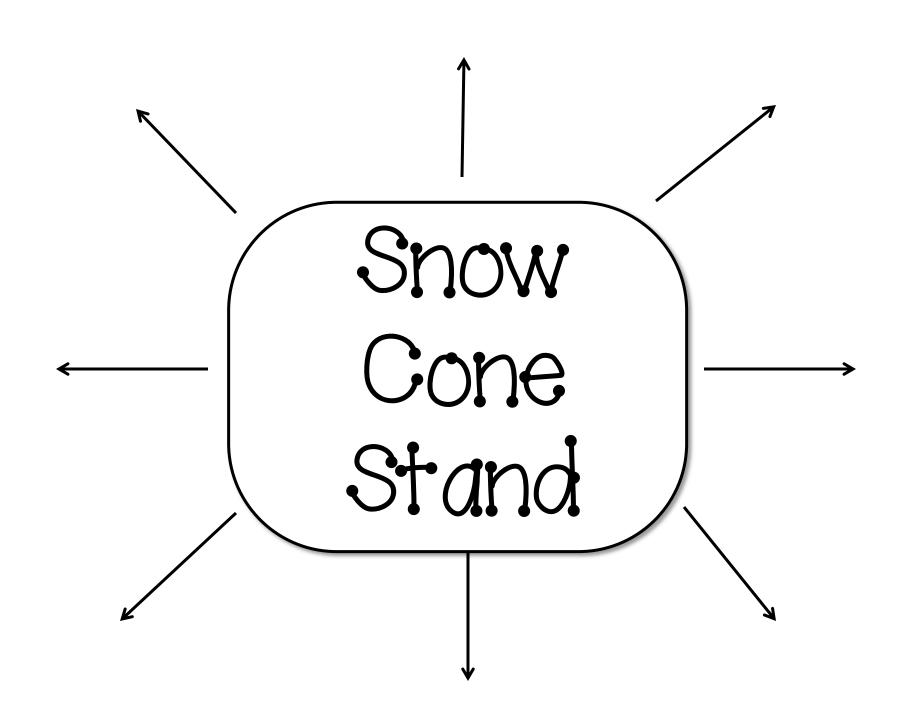


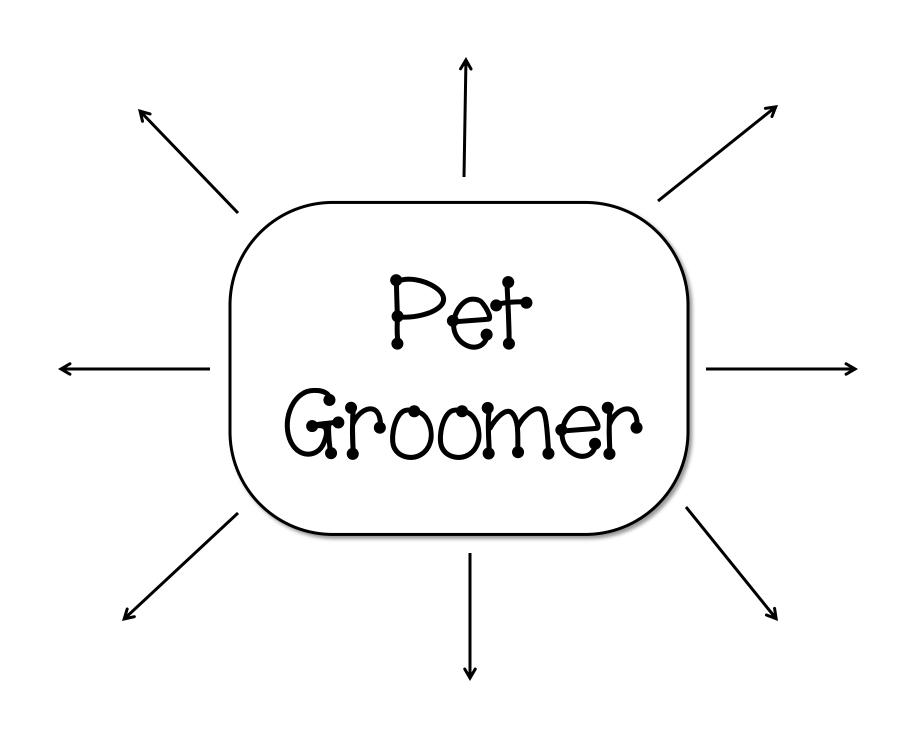


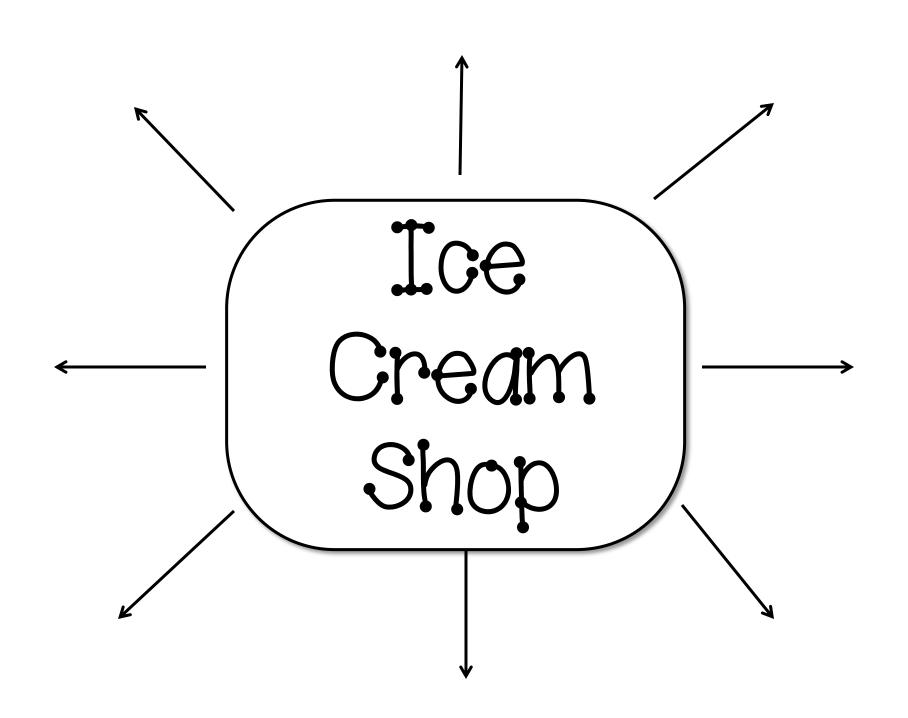

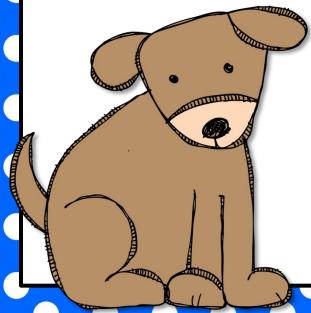
Cupcake Business

Dog Care Business

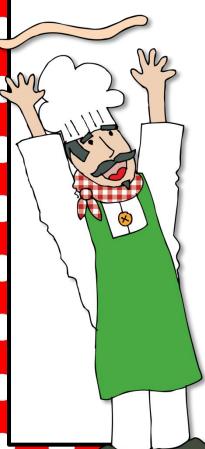

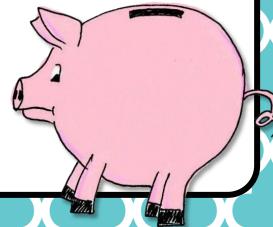

Supply & Demand Auction

To help students understand the concept of supply and demand, I have a class auction. The auction is included in the zipped file. I give each student 10 dollars for the auction, and I DON'I tell them how many items there are. Every student doesn't buy something, so to easy the feelings after the auction I give each student a mechanical pencil and a piece of bubble gum (these are two items in the auction).

Supply & Demand Sort

I use this sort as an activity as another way for students to practice the concept of supply & demand. I print the sort on cardstock and laminate. I usually allow students to work in partners, however this could easily be used as an independent activity as well where the students cut and past the situations on the t-chart.

Market Day Parent Letter

As a way for students to apply what they are learning about economics, my class participates in a "Market Day." During this market day students create their own product or service to "sell" to their classmates. The letter on the next page explains the day in detail, and gives parents instructions they need to know for this at home project.

Advertising My Product

After teaching students about the different types of advertisements that companies use to inform their consumers about their products, students create their own advertisements for their products. I ask that they include their product name, price, a slogan, an illustration or picture, and any key factors they think will persuade their consumers. I print premade templates on 11x17 paper. They are included in the zip file.

Buy My Product-Persuasive Writing

While teaching students about advertisements, I think it is the perfect opportunity to teach students about persuasive writing. Students write a paragraph to explain why consumers should purchase their product. I teach this lesson over 1 week.

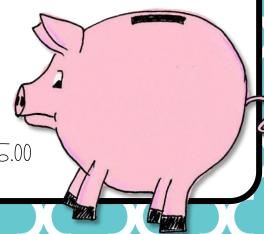

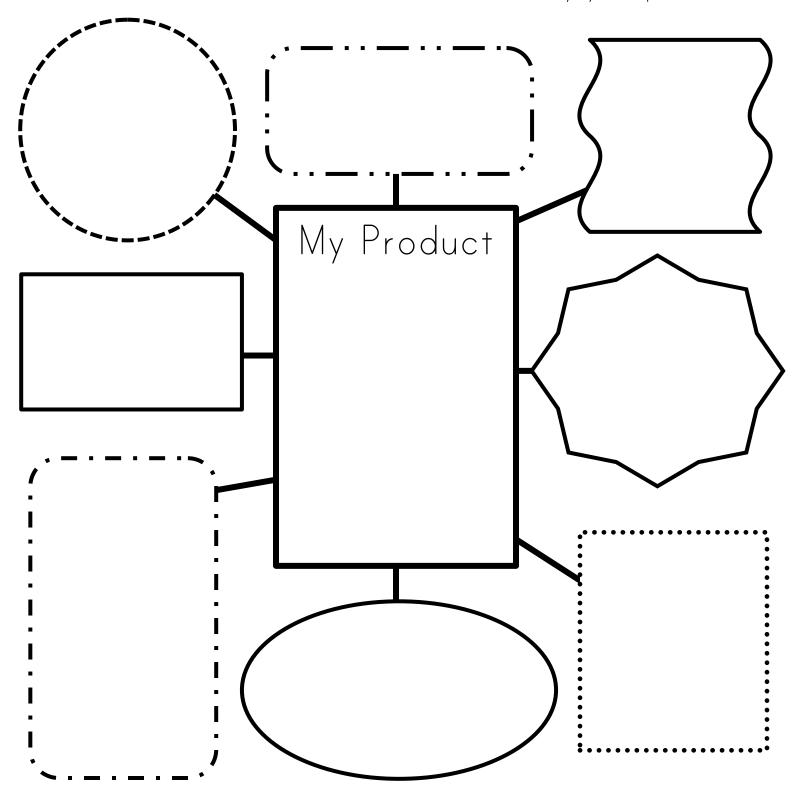

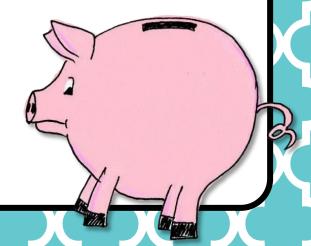
